### GREAT REVIVAL IN ANDREWS

Rev. Jesse J. Johnson of Newport, Tenn., closed a five weeks' revival here last Sunday night which the writer believes was the greatest revival held here in a number of years. There must have been fifty or more people saved during the five weeks of the meeting, and a large number of the converts were married men and women.

Brother Johnson has been an employee of the Southern Railway Company for twenty-eight years, but has been preaching only fifteen years. But this short time in the ministry has been such a great success that his railroad officials are willing to give him an indefinite leave of absence every year in order that he may be able to carry on his evangelistic work. During his short ministry Brother Johnson has held one or more revivals in every town on the Murphy Branch of Southern Railroad west of Asheville except Waynesville, which has been the means of getting more people into the churches of different denominations than any other minister during the same period of time, I believe.

The church people of all denominations were very favorably impressed with all of Brother Johnson's gospel messages which he brought to us each night, and we feel that great and lasting good was accomplished by his coming to Andrews.
