Amputees Asked Not To Wire VA

Until proper forms and instructions are received by the VA, amputee veterans in North Carolina are requested not to write or wire Veterans Administration offices concerning their eligibility for money with which to buy automobiles and other conveyances.

VA offices and contact representatives throughout the state expeets to be provided with application blanks within two or three weeks, but until announcement is made that the forms are available. veterans who think they may be eligible for funds are urged to "sit light" by Regional VA Officials.

Veterans Administration will administer the new \$30,000,000 program, set up by Public Law 663 to provide automobiles or other conveyances for disabled veterans of World War II who are entitled to compensation for the loss, or loss of use of, one or both legs at or above the ankle.


