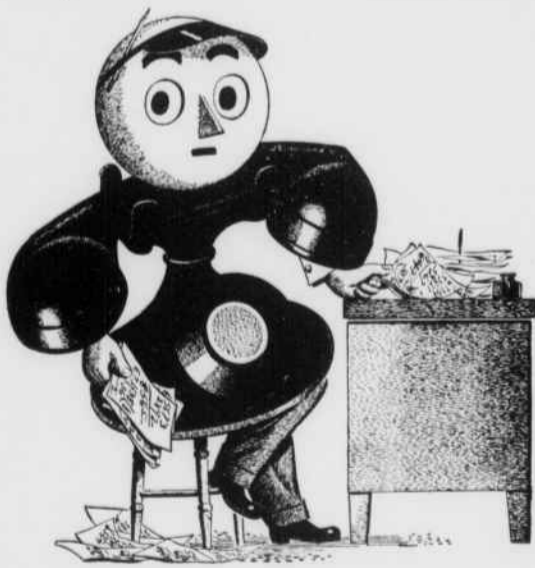
Even their amusements are the
