The annual membership drive of the North Carolina Symphony Society will begin in Cherokee county on February 3, it was announced today by Miss Addie Mae Cooke, chairman of the Symphony committee for this community. She stated that the committee believes the local membership goal of \$750 can be attained easily, in view of the highly successful appearances of the Orchestra in Andrews and other W. N. "The North Carolina Symphony is a creative project with human beings as source materials, and those source materials can have greater potentialities than atomic energy, Chairman Cooke said. "As a cultural 'advertisement,' the North Carolina Symphony has no peer in the state. These are days, too, when music as an international language is more sorely needed than ever before."




