Examination **Announced For Rural Carrier**

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to fill the position of rural carrier at Culberson, North Carolina. The examination will be held at

Murphy. Receipt of applications will close on March 6.

The date of examination will be stated on admission cards mailed o applicants after the closing date receipt of applications, and 01 will be about 15 days after that date.

The salary of a rural carrier on standard daily route of 30 miles \$2020 a year, with an additional \$20 a mile a year for each mile or najor fraction thereof in excess of 80 miles. Salaries on routes of shorter length or of less frequent ervice are proportionately lower. A rural carrier serving one triveekly route shall be paid a salary

on the basis of a route one-half the length of the route served by bim. A rural carrier serving two tri-weekly routes shall be paid a alary on the basis of a route onehalf the combined length of the

wo routes. All rural carriers must furnish and maintain at their own expense all neessary vehicle equipment for the prompt handling of the mails, but they are allowed an

equipment maintenance of 6 cents a mile on the basis of the daily mileage scheduled (this amount to \$549 per year for a 30-mile route) They are permitted to use motor vehicles, but are required to furnish sufficient equipment to handle postal business properly.

Assist In Filing Is Manager Income Tax Return Durham Branch O. G. Dellinger, deputy collector for the Internal Revenue Service, will be in Murphy at the courthouse February 24, 25, 26, to assist

taxpayers in completing their income tax returns for 1946. The tax return for 1946 must be filed not later than March 15, with the Collector of Internal Revenue. Most taxpayers have already made substantial payments on their 1946 Federal tax through withholding

from their wages, or direct payments, but all whose income was \$500 or more must file annual returns as provided by law.


