Churches Will Have Special Sermons, Music

Easter sunrise services will be held at 6 o'clock Sunday morning, on Petrie hospital hill, with all churches in the community participating. The service is held near the hospitals for the benefit of patients who will be unable to attend services during the day.

The Rev. J. Alton Morris, pastor of First Baptist church, will lead a brief Easter meditation, and other pastors will read scripture and offer prayer. Special music and group singing will be a part of the service.

All churches are planning special Easter services at the regular hours Sunday.

The Rev. Russell L. Young will use for his theme at the First Methodist church at 11 o'clock, "The Empty Tomb", and at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, he will begin a series of messages on the Apostles Creed, the subject for Sunday night being "I Believe in God."

At the morning service the choir will sing the voluntary, "Now Is Christ Risen" by Roy E. Nolte, and a trio composed of C. R. Freed, W. D. King and Jack Taylor will sing the anthem, "There Was a Garden" by Nolte.

At the evening service the prelude will be "In the End of the Sabbath", by Nolte, and the anthem, "The Way to Calvary" by Ruth Dale, sung by the choir.

At First Baptist church Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, the Rev. J. Alton Morris will preach on, "The Resurrection". Mrs. J. W. The Easter service of Holy Communion will be celebrated at 5:15 P. M. at the Church of The Messiah, Episcopal Church, by the Rev. A. Rufus Morgan of Franklin. Communicants of other Christian bodies who are in good standing in their own churches are also welcome to communicate at this service. Easter music will be played by Mrs. Ben Warner.

The members of the Woman's Auxiliary of The Church of The Messiah will take parts in a three hour watch service on Good Friday from 12 to 3 P. M. The service will be held in the church. The service will consist of scripture readings, prayers, hymns, and the reading of meditations on "Jesus' Seven Last Words on the Cross". There will be an introductory period from 12:00 till 12:10. Creel Census To Be Taken April 12-13th

Attractive prizes are being offered to fishermen who will participate in the Creel census to be conducted by the TVA on Hiwassee Lake at Hiwassee Dam on April 12 and 13. The prizes are being given by the Two Lakes Recreation club at Hiwassee Dam, sponsors of the census.

Fishermen are urged to participate in the census by fishing on the lake on the above dates. It is desired that as many as possible use their own boats and motors. Those planning to cooperate are asked to give their names either to Duke Whitley of Murphy or Bill McCoy of Hiwassee Dam, publicity officer for the sponsoring club.

Bass, pike and crappie taken from the lake during the census taking will be tagged and put back into the lake. A prize is offered for the largest one caught during the two-day period. A prize also will be given everybody who catches any of the tagged fish in the future. Duplicate prizes also will be given to the one who originally caught the fish.

The census is being conducted for TVA under the direction of Dr. R. W. Eschmeyer, fishing specialists for the purpose of determining how fast the fish in the lake are growing, whether they are receiving the proper amount of food, if the stock is being depleted, where the fish are being caught, and whether the lake needs restocking.

The census will start at 7 a. m. (CST) on both days.

THE ABOVE MAP points out Greek-Turkish areas affected by U. S. documentary disclosures and recent critical developments. Washington is reported to favor retention of Greece's 1939 frontiers (indicated by numeral 1) and to support the Greeks in a claim against Albania (2) for northern Epirus (3)—a matter for the Foreign Ministers Council in Moscow. A free zone in Salonika (4), under Greek sovereignty, is suggested, while "Soviet plans for control and defense" of the Dardanelles (5) are viewed with alarm. Also the U. S. favors cession of the Dodecanese (6) to Greece. Shaded area in northern Greece shows center of present guerrilla operations against the government. (International)
