Tennessee 10, will give the greatest yield if locally grown seed are used. If locally grown hybrid seed are not available, plant Holcombes Prolific white corn or Jarvis Golden Prolific yellow corn. Seed should be spaced 16 inches in four-foot rows or 18 inches in 312

foot rows a 5-10-5 fertilizer should be used. and will give best results if put in the row. A side dress of at least 200 pounds of nitrate of soda or 100 pounds of ammonium nitrate should be used if available. It these nitrates are not available, it will usually pay to side dress with a fertilizer with a high nitroger content.
