#### **Bond-A-Month** Plan Sponsored By Local Bank

Beginning today, more than 90 per cent of the commercial banks of the nation will offer the new Bond-a-Month Plan for the auto matic purchase of U.S. Savings Bonds, according to a Treasury Department statement in Washington.

The Bond-aMonth Plan, as explained by W. Frank Forsyth, Cashier of the Citizens Bank & Trust Co. is simply this: A depositor signs a form authorizing the bank to debit his checking account with the purchase price of a bond or bonds of the denomination he desires issued to him each month. The bank delivers the bonds monthly, free of charge.

Pay should be filed before September 1, 1947, states D. E. Sigmon, service officer.

The Armed Forces Leave Avt of 1946 (P. L. 704, 79th Congress) authorized payment of terminal leave pay for all enlisted service men in the armed forces of the United States for all furloughs (or leave) which have not been used during the active duty period of the applicant. Payment must be made at the rate of pay of the veteran at the time he was last sepa rated from enlisted service. 
