## FIELDS OF THE WOOD

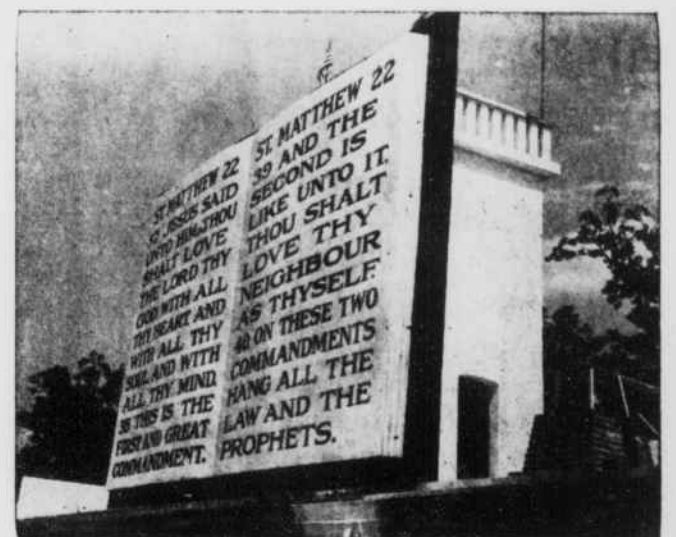
Tuesday Morning, August 12, At 10:00 O'Clock
