If you plan to seed ladino clove or pasture this fall, then you will be interested in a new circular just released by the State College Extension Service.

Prepared by Dr. R. L. Lovvorn professor of Agronomy, and S. H. Dobson, Extension Agronomy spec ialist, both of State College, the circular is prepared for the bene of hundreds of farmers wh plan to seed this wonder clover for the first time this fall.

Although ladino clover is a new egume for North Carolina, hundreds of farmers have seeded it during the past two years and are enthusiastic about its performance Much of the popularity of this clover is due to the great carrying capacity, long grazing season, high mineral and protein content, and its perennial nature

Authors of the circular have discussed the clover from its adaptation to various sections of the state, seeding and seedbed pre-paration, liming and fertilization,

and uses and management. Copies are now available for distribution. Interested persons may receive copies by writing to Agricultural Editor, State College Sta-
