Missouri, New Hampshire, and District of Columbia, one each: Cuba, two: Brazil, one.

The North Carolina students come from 88 counties.

With a total enrollment of 1320 students in the district which will account for 26,400 pupil days, there has been in excess of 1,280 absences during the past month. The average is slightly larger than 64 students out of their classes each

These absences have been during the best weather of the school year. As soon as the cold weather strikes this section of the state, the mount of absences will be increased by a large margin, in the opinon of the superintendent.


