Robinson Reports On NCEA Requests

ANDREWS—The local unit of the NCEA held a meeting last week to hear a report from Boyd Robinson who attended the recent NCEA state meeting in Raleigh of the local presidents and chairmen of the legislative committees.

Mr. Robinson said that practically all local NCEA units in the state reported that the teachers in their particular units were one hundred percent in favor of asking Governor Cherry to call a special session of the General Assembly to provide funds to meet increased costs of living for school personnel and by so doing to avert further disintegration of and disaster in the public schools of North Carolina.

The local NCEA candidates also went on record asking for state appropriations to help the poorer counties in their school building programs. Mr. Robinson stated that Cherokee county would benefit greatly from such an appropriation from the General Assembly. The local NCEA candi-

dates also went on record asking for a smaller teacher load. There are many classrooms in North Carolina containing 40 to 50 pupils. Especially is this true of the elementary schools. The actual effective class size that has been demonstrated from experience is from 16 to 25 — preferably, under most circumstances, between 18 and 22.

Mr. Robinson quoting from a report by W. E. Abernathy, Superintendent of Shelby City Schools, gave the following figures on the Present State General Fund Surplus or Reserve: "A \$52,000,000 estimate reserve to meet General fund debt, a \$30,976,056 post-war reserve fund, a \$12,011,430 unappropriated surplus—year ending June 30, 1947, and many additional millions of surplus accruing monthly." Supt. Abernathy also had this to say: "What shall it profit a state to pile up a huge surplus while many of its unfortunate and handicapped citizens and its million school children are being denied what they are entitled to and what the state can afford?"

Mr. Robinson gave data to show that while the money is piling up in our State Treasury, we have
