

T. V. A. News

Traffic on the Tennessee River during the month of January topped the record for the same period a year ago with a volume of 78,630 tons and a ton-mileage of 25,724,200—90 percent and 102 percent respectively over traffic in January 1947. This year ice conditions on connecting waterways isolated the river during the latter

part of the month. Although some floating ice was reported in the reservoirs, at no time was the Tennessee channel frozen over.

Tree planting in Henderson County, Tennessee, has reached the ten million mark, a record equaled by no other Valley county. Ceremonies dedicating the

ten-millionth tree planted by private landowners were held at the Lexington High School on February 17. Sponsored by the Lexington Rotary Club, the program included talks by representatives of the Tennessee Division of Forestry, Tennessee Extension Service and TVA. The ten-millionth tree, a loblolly pine, was planted on the school campus by State Forester J. O. Hazard to commemorate the progress made in reforestation. In addition to the ten million trees planted on private lands, some five million have been planted by the state on that portion of Natchez Trace State Forest Park within the county. Henderson County landowners continue to plant trees at the rate of about half a million a year.

The minimum price that the Tennessee Valley Authority will accept for the Town of Norris, which is going on the auction block, is \$1,849,750. TVA has announced. The Town of Norris, a residential community of 1,250 population, is 4 miles from Norris Dam, and about 21 miles northwest of Knoxville, Tennessee. A prospectus which describes the town, discusses its present use and future possibilities, and outlines the terms and conditions of sale, was mailed today to many prospective bidders. Copies of the prospectus may be obtained from TVA's Land Branch, Property and Supply Division, Knoxville.

TVA first will make an effort to dispose of the 1,284-acre property as a single unit. If no offers are received for the town as a unit by approximately May 31 of this year, the single unit offer will be withdrawn and TVA will proceed with plans to sell individual pieces of property at auction. In this event, present residents of the town will have an opportunity to bid on the property.

Until then, however, every effort will be made to sell the town as a single unit. Prospective bidders will have an opportunity to buy not only the town, but also one or both of two additional blocks of land. The first of these consists of 66 acres of undeveloped land, minimum acceptable bid for which is \$9,000; the second block consists of 134 acres of undeveloped land, minimum acceptable bid for which is \$18,100. Both tracts lie south of Norris, but nearby.

Norris is located in Anderson County, Tennessee, on the direct highway between Knoxville and Cincinnati via Norris Dam. It lies near the western edge of the broad valley between the Cumberland and Great Smoky Mountains, known as the Great Valley of East Tennessee, a continuation of the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia.

Contracts have been awarded for carrying out two USDA research projects approved under the causes of flavor deterioration and staling of bakery products. The other seeks new methods and official standards for measuring the bread-baking quality of wheat.

\$9,035 Invested In Bonds Here In February

W. D. Whitaker, Chairman of the Cherokee County U. S. Savings Bonds Committee, announced today that according to the monthly report received from State Director Allison James in Greensboro, total E, F and G Bonds sales in February for Cherokee County amounted to \$9,035.50. Of this total \$8,887.50 were E Bonds, \$148.00 in Series F Bonds, and NONE in Series G Bonds.

The total February state sales in North Carolina's 100 counties were as follows: Series E Bonds, \$4,353,667.75; Series F Bonds, \$714,008.50; Series G Bonds, \$1,846,300.00; total E, F and G Bond sales \$8,616,976.25. The total represents about 3% increase over total E, F and G January sales for the state as a whole, and a 20% increase in Series E Bonds sales over January E sales.

Mr. Whitaker announced that the Treasury Department supported by the American Bankers Association, industrial and farm leaders, the National Retail Dry Goods Association, U. S. Chamber of Commerce and other state and national public-spirited groups will put on the first all-out, post-war Savings Bonds Campaign April 15 through June 30. It will be known as the Security Loan and will compare in its promotional aspects and public appeal to the last of the great War Loans—the Victory Loan.

The purpose in conducting the Security Loan, said Mr. Whitaker, is to encourage Americans to build greater security for themselves through greater savings, to spread the national debt widely among individuals, to relieve inflationary pressures on our economy. The slogan for the Security Loan will be "America's Security is Your Security."

Good Use Of Canned Foods

The season for vegetables will soon be here, but in the meantime a little variety will work wonders in preparing canned vegetables to eat. The following recipe should make a hit with your family:

Mushroom Lima Bean Ramekins
1 4-oz. can sliced mushrooms 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1/2 cup diced celery 1 No. 2 can lima beans
2 tablespoons butter 1/4 cup diced pimientos
3 tablespoons flour 3 hard-cooked eggs
1/2 tablespoon salt 1/2 cup buttered coarse crumbs
dash pepper

Drain liquid from mushrooms, saving it to go into sauce. Brown mushrooms and celery in butter, stir in the flour and let it brown lightly. Add seasonings, mushroom liquid and liquid from beans. Cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Combine with mushrooms, beans, and pimientos. Cut up the eggs and add to the mixture. Put into buttered individual dishes, top with crumbs, bake about 20 minutes in 375° oven, or until browned. Will serve eight.

Vegetables Lyonnaise
2 medium size onions salt
2 tablespoons butter pepper
1 No. 2 can peas 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
1 No. 2 can whole kernel corn, or 12-oz. size vacuum pack can
Cut onions into thin slices, separate into rings and saute in butter. Add the liquid drained from vegetables and let simmer until it is reduced to about one-half cup. Add peas and corn. Season to suit taste. Heat thoroughly, and add parsley just before removing from heat. Serves ten.

Hot Bean Salad
2 strips bacon 1/2 teaspoon mustard
1/3 cup chopped onion dash pepper
1 No. 2 can baked beans 1/4 cup vinegar
1/2 cup water
Cut bacon into half-inch pieces, fry to a light brown. Add onion and brown lightly. Add remaining ingredients and simmer until beans are soft. Drain and water. Serve hot. Four servings.

Scalloped Tomatoes
3 slices bread 2 tablespoons

chopped onion
2 tablespoons butter 2 teaspoons sugar
1 No. 2 can tomatoes 1 teaspoon salt
dash pepper
Cut bread into one-half inch cubes, saute in butter to a light brown. Save out a few pieces for the top and combine the remaining ones for the other ingredients. Pour into a buttered baking dish and top with bread cubes. Bake about 30 minutes in a 375° oven.

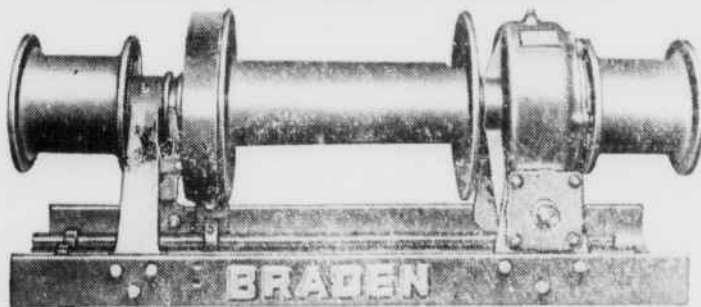
