(Continued from page one) and three Republican contests in the May 29 primaries, as follows: In the gubernatorial campaign are six contenders—Mayne Albright of Raleigh, Oscar Barker of Durham, Olla Ray Boyd of Pine-town, Charles M. Johnson of Raleigh, W. Kerr Scott of Haw River and W. F. Stanley, Sr., of Winston. The senate contest brings together William B. Umstead of Durham, the incumbent, and J. Melville Broughton of Raleigh, a former governor. There will be six congressional contests among Democrats. Two will be for seats which are being vacated by retirement: John H. Folger of Mt. Airy, fifth district, and J. Bayard Clark of Fayetteville, seventh, are stepping down at the end of the year. The congressional contests include: Fifth district—Lauremond Char-ham of Elkin and Bob Duncan of Walnut Cove. Tenth—Hamilton C. Jones, in-cumbent, and Marvin Lee Ritch both of Charlotte. Eleventh—A. L. Bufamkle of Gastonia, incumbent, and Clarence G. Ridings of Forest City. Other Democratic contenders: Lieutenant governor—H. P. (Pat) Taylor of Wadesboro and Dan Tompkins of Sylva. Secretary of state—Thad Eure, incumbent, and John T. Arm-strong, both of Raleigh. State auditor—Henry L. Bridg-es of Greensboro, incumbent, and Charles W. Miller of Asheville. State treasurer—Zack Frazelle of Richlands, Brandon P. Hodges of Asheville and James B. Volger of Charlotte. Commissioner of labor—Forrest H. Shuford of Raleigh, incumbent, and Donald Boone Sherrill of

Greensboro.

On the Republican side, there is only one statewide contest, Watt H. Graze of Boone and G. L. Willard of Kernersville are running for nomination as com-missioner of agriculture. The other GOP contests are for congressional nominations. Five men will contest in the 10th dis-trict—P. C. Burkholder, Manley R. Dunaway and Louis G. Rogers, all of Charlotte, Roy A. Harmon of Elk Park and T. L. Maillen of Huntersville.

Commission Taking Poll On Schools

A poll of parents and school patrons of this county is being conducted this week by the State Education Commission in its "grass roots" study of education in this state. A similar poll is being conducted through the state. Local organizations such as the P. T. A., Lions club and other groups are participating.

Parents of ninth and twelfth graders are being asked their opinions on the public schools' organization, administration and finance, curriculum and instruction, instructional personnel and pupil services.

Questionnaires are being distributed by superintendents, principals and teachers in the city and county schools. The study will include opinions of parents of sixth graders in the 16 selected cities and counties in which the Education Commission is making special surveys.

The questionnaires were prepared for the specific purpose of enabling a cross-section of the total citizenship of the state to give opinions of our present system and to make suggestions for a better school program according to W. H. Plimmons, executive secretary of the Commission.

Some of the results will be announced at a meeting of the Commission on April 3 in Raleigh. They will be used as a part basis for a report by the Education Commission to the Governor and the 1949 General Assembly.

Parents are being queried among other things as to their opinion on the number of students a teacher should have; their willingness to pay higher taxes if better schools are desired; and on the reason for children dropping out of school at an early age.

Miss Addie Mae Cooke of Mur-phy is on the elementary educa-tion committee of the commission.
