Farm Training Program Reaches Nearly 200 Men

A total of 192 trainees are taking advantage of the Farm Training program for veterans in Cherokee county. An average enrollment of 140 has been maintained for the past two-year period.

The primary purpose of the Veterans Farmer Training program is to help World War II Veterans get established in the business of farming, whereby at the end of their training period they will have acquired enough information, experience, and capital to become self-sufficient.

During the latter part of 1946, Murphy high school set up an agriculture department not only to take care of the many veterans in this county interested in farming, but also to broaden its curriculum for high school boys.

The shop building at Murphy high school was set aside as department headquarters. With school funds and federal funds paid to the school by the Veterans Administration to train Veteran Farmers, a first class department has been built. A classroom has been constructed, a shop fully equipped, reference library established, audio visual aids and equipment obtained, and much

other miscellaneous equipment acquired.

The department is under the supervision of Glenn Patton, teacher of agriculture of Murphy High school. Working with him are a number of assistant teachers who work together for the Veteran Farmer Training program. Each assistant teacher is in charge of a number of veterans varying from fourteen to eighteen.

The Farm Program trainees are getting a scientific agricultural background and are applying the most up-to-date methods. The informal and varied methods of teaching include lectures, group discussions, on the job instructions, experience, field trips, shop work, an unlimited amount of available printed materials, and extensive use of audio visual aids.

In the near future a report of accomplishments for the year of 1947 will be ready for publication in this newspaper. This will give the public an opportunity to see the work that has been accomplished by the Veteran trainees.
