Wildcat Schedule Is Announced

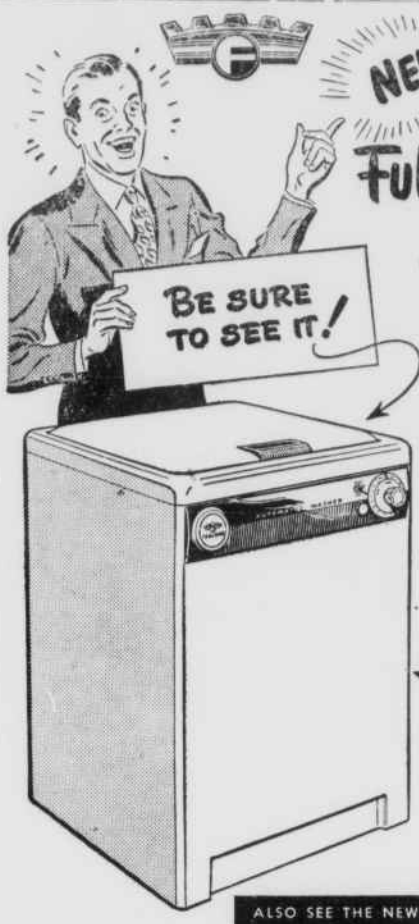

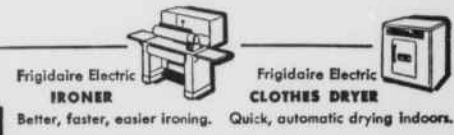
Surviving are the husband and two daughters by a former marriage.

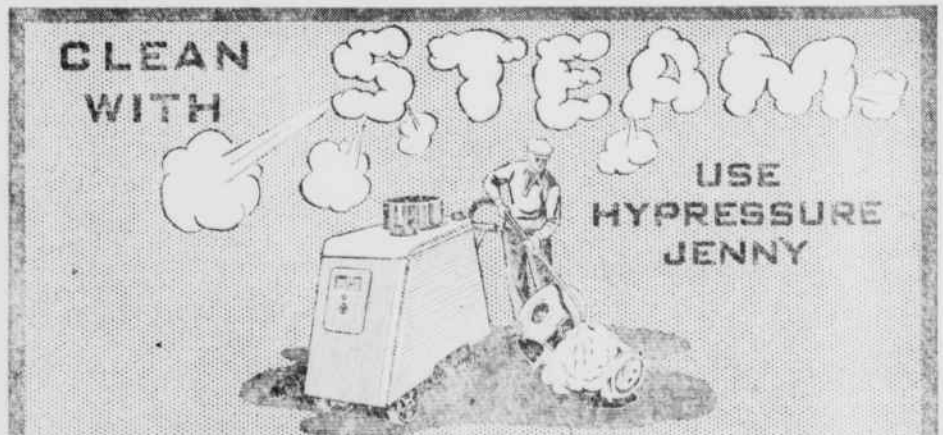

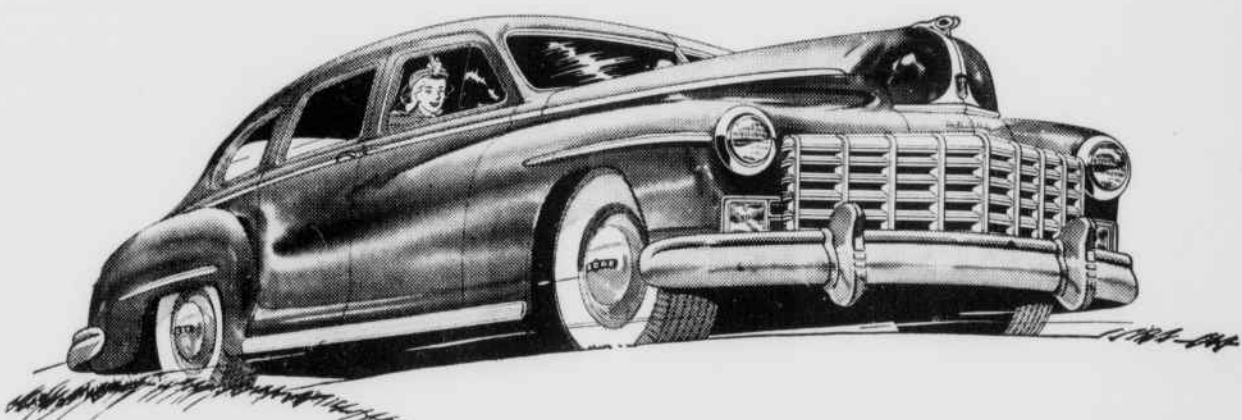
