

### Packaging Materials For Freezing

Fresh foods, properly packaged and frozen, come from the freezer just as good as when frozen. Home freezing, however, is not so simple that rules can be disregarded. One of the most important of these is the use of proper packaging material.

All packaging material must be moisture-vapor-proof. It must be of a type that will not absorb grease, oil, water, blood, or impart any flavor to food. Packaging material should also be durable, easy to fill, handle, and seal.

Special packaging material has been developed for the safe keeping of frozen foods. Suitable materials for home freezing include cylindrical waxed containers, round waxed cups, square or rectangular waxed cartons, moisture-proof bags, moisture-proof cellophane, plovilm, latex bags, and metal foils. Glass jars and tin cans are completely vapor proof

and excellent containers for frozen foods and can be used more than once. Glass jars are easily broken, however, and both glass jars and tin cans take up more space in the freezer than other types of packages.

Ordinary wax or oiled papers are not satisfactory for keeping frozen foods. The use of poor quality packaging materials is "penny wise, pound foolish." Such materials permit loss of vitamins, changes in flavor and color, and drying out of the foods.

The waxed containers are popular for storage of fruits, juices, vegetables, and a variety of other foods. Moisture-vapor-proof lined rectangular cartons are also suitable for packing fruits and vegetables and for chops and disjointed poultry. To seal the inner bag used in such cartons, a warm iron or an ordinary curling iron may be used. Both types of containers must be leak-proof when filled.

Treated papers, cellophane, and metal foils make good packaging material for irregularly shaped pieces of meat, roasting chickens, fish, and such vegetables as asparagus. The food should be wrapped closely, the edges brought together in tight double folds, and sealed or securely tied. Such packages must be over-wrapped with durable paper or covered with stockinette to protect the inner wrap.

Some users prefer glass and tin jars even though they take up more room in the freezer. These jars should be filled only about nine-tenths full to allow for expansion of the food when frozen. Glass jars and tin cans should not be used for vegetables that are to

be cooked without thawing, and tin cans, unless enamel lined, should not be used for fruits.

The container used should be of a size to fit the needs of the family since the food can not be refrozen. It is easy for the homemaker to calculate servings from the pint and quart size packages. A pint or pound serves three to four persons. Meats should also be cut and wrapped according to servings.

Some space should be left at the top of all packages of liquid foods for expansion after freezing. Date and label all packages for easy finding when used.

Properly packaged and frozen foods are preserved without change in their appearance, flavor, or nutrients. No other method of preservation of foods so many advantages.
