Whitaker Davis And Marie Watts Take Top Honors

ANDREWS—Two distinct honors came to Whitaker Davis here in the Andrews high school on Monday. Davis was first named in a secret ballot participated in by members of the junior and senior classes and by the high school faculty, the 1948 outstanding senior. A subsequent tabulation of the scholastic records made by members of his class over the four years showed him to have made the highest average grade of 95.62, which automatically makes him class valedictorian.

The salutatorian is Miss E. Marie Watts of Andrews.

As outstanding senior Davis will be awarded at the forthcoming commencement the much prized Edwidge memorial gold medal, and his name will be engraved on the school's permanent trophy, which carries only the names of those students who have attained this honor. Davis' name will be the ninth entry.

Davis has made a splendid record as a student. In addition to other extra-curricular activities he has made the varsity squad in football, basketball and baseball. During this time he has maintained a Citizen-Times paper route and has had a part-time job at Henn theatre. In his athletic career he has suffered nothing worse than the fracture of both ankles, one each for different seasons, which put him on crutches for several weeks.

This popular student is the son of Dr. and Mrs. H. E. Davis of Andrews. He is the fifth of the five Davis children to receive commencement honors in Andrews high school, of which there have been three valedictorians and two salutatorians.

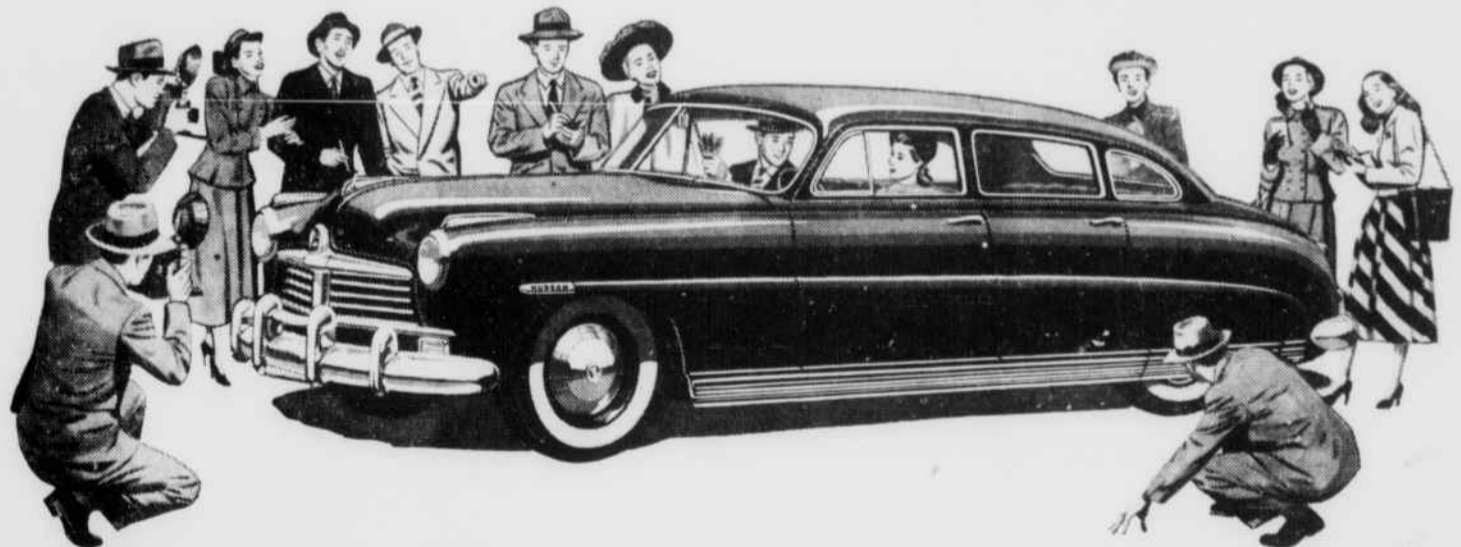
