

# T. V. A. News

North Alabama reservoirs yielded over 100,000 pounds of catfish during the month of May, yet the demand is greater than the supply. Most of the catch came from Wilson, oldest of the North Alabama reservoirs. The largest catfish caught weighed 108 pounds; average weight was six pounds. Commercial fishermen also took over a hundred thousand pounds of spongbill, drum, buffalo and carp. Some buffalo were shipped to Mobile and several shipments of spongbill went as far as California.

The total gross electric power generation in May was 1,313,221, 774 kilowatt-hours, which is 0.3 percent more than that of the previous month. A new record was established with a maximum hour-

ly gross generation of 2,439,000 kilowatts at 11 a. m. May 7.

At least 200 young wood ducks were hatched this spring in the upper portion of Big Sandy De-watering Project, Kentucky Reservoir. If other areas of the main reservoir have young ducks in the same proportion, the wood duck population on the reservoir will be large this season.

**CONSTRUCTION PROGRESS**—Good progress was made at Watauga Dam, the earth fill totaling about 220,000 cubic yards for the month, and the rock fill about 120,000 cubic yards. In the reservoir, clearing and burning continued, grading on the state highway relocations was entirely completed, and good progress made on county

highways.—South Holston: Contracts for the turbine and generator were let. Good progress was made on the drilling for the first large blast in quarry No. 4 and well drilling has been started in quarry No. 2.

### NOTES ON RECREATIONAL DEVELOPMENTS ON TVA RESERVOIR PROPERTIES:

Following the licensing of the wartime Disco Slip near Decatur to the Wheeler Lake Yacht Club, there has been a general improvement in facilities and services for owners of pleasure craft in the area. A full time operator is now on duty and new boat anchorages and concession stand have been built.

The State of Alabama plans to spend half of a proposed million dollar loan for state park development on Little Mountain State Park, on a site near Guntersville, transferred to the state by TVA last year.

Temporary power service that will permit the installation of refrigeration and lights at a fishermen's concession stand just below Guntersville Dam has been completed.

At Kentucky Lake State Park, the public swimming beach is near completion, and the state has immediate plans for construction of a bathhouse, water system and sewage system as part of the beach facilities.

The north overlook building at Chickamauga Dam has received repairs and alterations that make the structure suitable for housing a concession refreshment stand.

For the benefit of anglers fishing at night near the lock wall at Chickamauga Dam, a surplus TVA floodlight has been installed, eliminating shadows which made the riprap hazardous. The location is a favorite of night fishermen, who come to the spot after daytime work.

Two new picnic areas are under development on the Chickamauga reservation, to supplement the single inadequate, area which has been carrying the entire load there.

Construction of lakeside cottages in the Meigs Cabin Site Area on Watts Bar Lake is proceeding rapidly, following the leasing of lots several months ago. Two cottages have been finished and three more are under way.

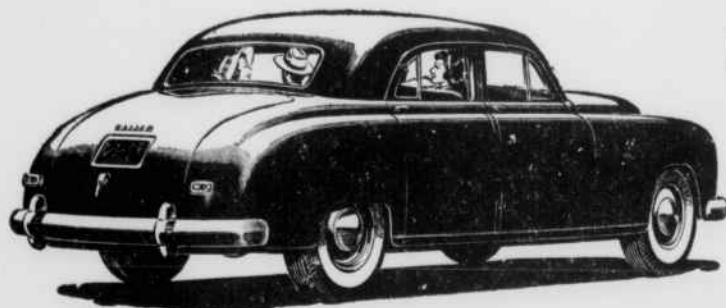
