## Mashburn Guest Speaker Sunday At Baptist Church

ANDREWS—Rev. David Mashburn, Minister of Education at the Central Baptist Church of Miami, Fla., talked to a home town audience here at the Baptist church on last Sunday morning. The former Andrews resident chose for his text words recorded in St. Mark 8:34-35 "Whosoever will come after me, let him deny him-

self, and take up his cross, and follow me. For whosoever will save his life shall lose it; but whosoever shall lose his life for my sake and the gospel's, the same shall save it."

The Rev. Mr. Mashburn gave three reasons why one should follow Christ. In the first place, "because he loved us so much". Several examples were given of how Christ loved us. And secondly, "because we have only one life". The uncertainty of life and its vicissitudes were revealed to the audience. Lastly, the visiting minister said, "there is no thrill to equal that of following Christ".

Mr. Mashburn was presented to the audience by the pastor, Rev. T. Earl Ogg. The local pastor said that he had first known Mr. Mashburn when he was associated with the Broadway Baptist church in Knoxville of which the Andrews pastor was then a member and a mere youth.

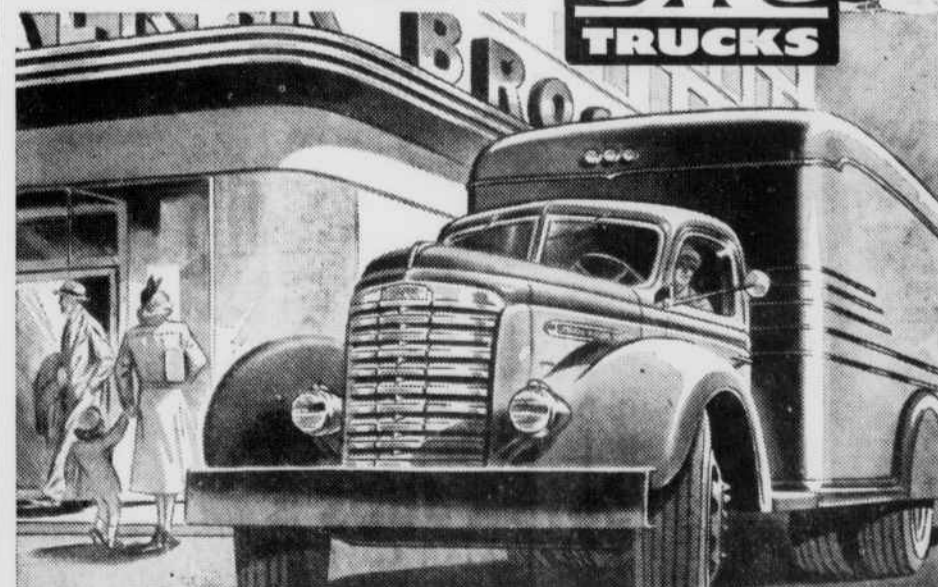
