

Andrews Downs Franklin 14-0

ANDREWS—The Andrews high school football team in its initial game of the season turned back the Franklin team on the latter's field on Friday night before an estimated 800 spectators by a score of 14-0. The Franklin Panthers came to the game without the service of their biggest star, the latter being on Coach Atkins' injured list. But in any event, with the drive and power shown by the Andrews players, they would hardly have been denied victory.

The 14-0 score fails to tell the complete story. At half time Andrews was on the Franklin 9-yard line. After the first five minutes of play in which Franklin made two very fine kicks and Andrews made two very poor ones, the winner seemed not in doubt. The running of Sam (buzz-bomb) Webb was exceptional. He first took a thrilling rocket dash of 30-yards in the second period that brought the ball to the Franklin 3-yard

line, which he carried over on the next play. In the third period Webb took another 70-yard trip, slowing only when he passed the shadows of the goal posts.

The Andrews line was outstanding, and was too much for the Panthers for 60 grueling minutes. Earl Parker carried the ball for the first extra point, and Joe Womack took a pass from Parker for the second extra point. Getting away for some fine runs also was Wilson. Butler, in the backfield, and Christy and Marr, were excellent in the line.

The whole Andrews team played good football, and thereby reflected credit on their coach. The Wildcats made nine first downs to three for the panthers.

Andrews' next game is with Robinsville on Friday night, September 24 at Robinsville. The first home game will be with Bryson City, Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock on October 1.

The North Carolina corn crop this year is expected to yield about 74 million bushels—13 per cent above the 1947 crop and 45 per cent more than the average for the previous ten years.

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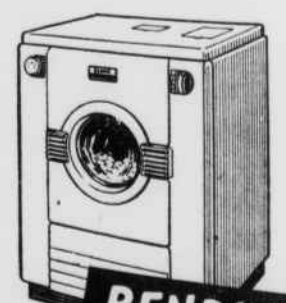
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
