

Notla Helen's Henrietta Is High Producer

Charles Walker and Bill Russell of Andrews and Gwen Cornwell of Brassstown are the herd owners who have placed their herds on test this month.

The averages of milk and fat per cow, per herd, for the whole association are low this month as they were in October. Fall and early winter is a hard time to keep cows from falling off in milk. Steps should be taken by the herd owners in the association to bring milk production up to the level of spring and summer, during the fall and winter months.

Listed below are three ways by

which dairymen may increase milk production during this period:

(1) Breed most of the cows and especially young helpers for fall freshening. Statistics show that the cow which freshens in the fall will give more milk in a year's time than one freshening in the spring.

(2) Cows can be grazed some every month in the winter if an adequate small grain, crimson clover, orchard grass and fence pasture is prepared for them.

(3) Proper housing with plenty of good quality, at least part legume hay and silage is a very important step toward production of milk during the winter months.

Out of seventeen associations listed in the October Extension Dairy News only three had a lower average production per cow than that of this Association. This association of course is the youngest association in the state and several of the dairymen are just getting started. The average could be brought up some by culling inferior animals, but a great improvement could be shown by observing the three practices outlined above.

The high cow in both milk and butter fat production this month is Notla Helen's Henrietta, of the Shields' herd, who led the association last month. Henrietta's record is 1395 lbs. of milk and 657 lbs. of fat.

Aloeca Piebe Segis a registered Holstein belonging to Gwen Cornwell was second in milk with 1293 lbs.

The second cow in butter fat production was Speck's Twin a grade Jersey in E. A. Wood's herd who made 1056 lbs. of milk and 56.1 lbs. of fat.

Gwen Cornwell led the association in average milk production and was second in average fat production with 831 lbs. of milk and 34.2 lbs. of fat per cow.

Charles Walker with 36.6 lbs. of fat and 681 lbs. of milk was high herd in butter fat per cow and second in average pounds of milk per cow.
