#### county ,and committees throughout the county are making solicitations. The county's quota is \$3, 600 but last week Dr. Chas. O. Van Gorder, county director, had the following message from Dr. Ralph McDonald, state chairman:

"I am afraid that we have set our goals too low in North Carolina this year. Our chapters in epidemic counties owe about \$350,000 right now in unpaid bils to hospitals and doctors. Costs for the 500 still in hospitals are running about \$42,000 a week. The follow-up treatment of those who have gone home is in addition. We cannot possibly get through the year 1949 with less than \$1,500,000 in our own chapters, even if we have no more cases. If we should raise only \$1,000,000 our chapters' treasuries would have only \$500. 000-just one-third or less of the minimum we know will be needed

"It may be that we are understimating the willingness of North Carolinians to give this year. Last year, after an epidemic, the people of Idaho gave an average of 46 cents per capita, and Idaho is almost all rural, with the people widely scattered. Our epidemic was much worse than Idaho's, and our people are easier to reach in this mild climate. If we see every person in the state personally, our people will surely give generous



### Under New Program For Education Cherokee Pays Less

program for the public schools of Cherokee county will cost an estimated \$604.124 next year, if the program for the state is passed in ts entirety by the General Assembly.

The estimate is based on an average annual salary of \$3,000 for eachers: \$300 per teacher for ther current expenses such as. peration and maintenance of schools, and instructional supplies and equipment and \$350 per teacher to be used to bring school buildings up to date.

estimated revenue for of Cherokee from the county, including fines and forfeitures, poll and dog taxes, and ad valorem for the 1947-48 budget was \$40,299 or which \$21,899 was for the Cherokee county unit; \$6,000 for the Andrews unit; and \$12,400 for the Murphy unit. The sources and amounts were estimattaxes Cherokee \$2,902. Andrews \$700, Murphy \$2,000; ad Valorem Cherokee \$8 768. Andrews \$3,500; Murchy \$7,400; and capital outlay ed valorem, Cherokee \$10,229; Andrews \$1,800, and Murphy \$3,000.

In the proposed educational program of 90 per cent state and 10 per cent local participation in Cherokee county would not have to expend as much as the estimated revenue for 1947-48, Only \$25,300 would be required as compared with the 1947-48 January 23, at 11 a. m. Holy the state, including transportation for 1947-48 was \$293 303, and the proposed allotment is \$578.824, an increase of \$285,521

> Cherokee county has only .244 per cent of the total valuation of the State. The above figures are estimated on that percentage.

> The numbers of employed state allotted teachers for 1948-49 were: Cherokee 57, Andrews 39, and Murphy 41. Under the proposed program the numbers would be: Cherokee 66. Andrews 45. and Murphy 47, a total increase of 21,

Estimated cost of the proposed foundation program, exclusive of transporation for the three units is: Instructional salaries, Cherokee \$190 000, Andrews \$135,000, Mur phy \$141,000; other current expenses Cherokee \$19.800; Andrews \$13,500; Murphy \$14,100; capital outlay. Cherokee \$22 440; Andrews \$15,300; Murphy \$15,980; making totals of, Cherokee \$240,240; Andrews \$163 800; Murphy \$171.080, and a county total of \$575,120.

Of that \$575,120, the county would be called upon to pay \$25,300, and the state \$549 820, plus \$29,004, for transportation. making a total provided by the state of \$578 824, and a total of \$604,124 by both state and county.

Employees of the town of Murphy may be hired and fired at will by the town commissioners under the terms of one bill intro-The bill would apply to all em-

loyes of the town, including the thief of police, town marshal. town clerk, fire chief, deputy marhal, and police officers, but not including the mayor and commis-

It provides that "no contract of mployment shall be entered into between the governing authority of the town of Murphy and any of the employes named above for the duration of the term of office of the members of the Town Council or Board of Town Commissioners or for any other period constituting a fixed term of duration of employment.

The bill would enable the Town Council or Board of Town Commissioners to set the salaries of all town employes

The mayor of Murphy would be given authority to require persons against whom fines have been entered to work on the streets or other public works of the town until the fines are paid off in cases of failure or refusal to pay fines.
