Applications For Safety Awards Now Being Made

Industrial plants which made conspicuous advances in on-the-job safety during 1948 are eligible for the "Certificate of Safety Achievement" which is presented annually to qualifying establishments by the North Carolina Department of Labor.

Announcement of the opening of applications for the safety award covering the year 1948 was made here today by George W. King, Safety Inspector representing the Department of Labor in the Murphy District.

"The Department of Labor is now receiving safety award applications from a number of industrial concerns on the basis of their plant safety records for last year," King said. "Plant officials who believe that their establishment has qualified for the Certificate of Safety Achievement by making the specified accident rate reductions may obtain the necessary application blanks from the district office of the Department of Labor at Asheville, or by writing direct to the Department at Raleigh."

Mr. King explained that industrial plants may qualify for the safety award in any one of three ways: (1) By having had a perfect record of no lost-time accidents during 1948; (2) by having reduced their accident frequency rates 40 per cent or more below their rates for the previous year; and (3) by having maintained during 1948 an accident rate at least 75 per cent below the State average for their industry.

"Qualifying establishments which already have received the Certificate of Safety Achievement for previous years will not be awarded a new certificate this year," Mr. King said. "Instead, they will be presented with a ribbon for attachment to their old certificate. The ribbon will bear an inscription indicating the number of consecutive years during which the establishment has qualified for the Labor Department's safety award."

The Department issues two types of awards, Mr. King added. One type is for establishments having 50 or more employees. This certificate is presented as a joint award from the North Carolina Department of Labor and the United States Department of Labor, and is signed by both Commissioner of Labor Forrest H. Shuford and Secretary of Labor Maurice J. Tobin. The other award presented by the State Labor Department only, is for plants having fewer than 50 employees and is signed by the Commissioner of Labor.

The Labor Department's safety awards program is one phase of the Industrial Manpower Conservation Program through which the Department, assisted by a 25-man advisory board of safety experts from leading industries, is working to reduce the accident frequency rates of all North Carolina industries, Mr. King said. More than 400 North Carolina firms were awarded the Safety Achievement Certificate last year.

Red Cross Aided In 1948 Polio Epidemic In State

CHAPEL HILL — Phillip S. Randolph, prominent Chapel Hill resident and known throughout the state for his work as North Carolina epidemic co-ordinator for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, today issued a statement of gratitude to the American Red Cross for the organization's work during the state epidemic and the program now being carried out in the convalescent period.

Said Randolph: "I should like to express my appreciation for the many services supplied to polio hospitals and patients by chapters of the Red Cross and by the Southeastern Area office of ARC during and following the North Carolina polio epidemic of 1948.

"It was always comforting to me to know that these services were available whenever and wherever they were needed. No statement that I could make would sufficiently express my gratitude to this great organization, for without the Red Cross aid during 1948 the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis would have had to fight an overwhelming battle in North Carolina."

Randolph went on to point out that in Orange County the local Red Cross chapter had supplied, through its sewing room, many of the isolation gowns worn by the polio nurses and hospital workers. The Orange County Chapter, said Randolph volunteered to transport polio victims in the county to and from treatment centers. This work is still being carried on.

In 1944, he related, the foundation and the American Red Cross entered into an agreement whereby the Red Cross was to recruit volunteer nurses during polio epidemics. This same year in North Carolina, the Red Cross recruited over 1,000 nurses from all over the United States to aid in the epidemic then raging.

"Without this service," stated Randolph, "it would have been impossible to give medical treatment to all of the polio victims. This past year the Red Cross sent over 700 nurses into our stricken state, and without this tremendous help the epidemic could never have been properly handled."
