

Williams explained the annual income return and gave a summary of the year's work. At the present time 19 families in the Bank Opens Farm Ownership group in the two counties have received loans totaling \$87 408. Based on the annual schedule of payments the total amount due is \$6,413. Total payments made to date amount to \$9,261. According to the annual income reports the FO Farm Dollar was paid out for the following purposes: Family Living 32% Farm Ownership Payment 12%, Capital Expenditures, 19%, Farm Operating 24% and Net Debt Repayment 13%.
