The new law also makes nonresidents subject to the same penalty provision. If the gross licensed weights of non-resident vehicles cannot be determined, such vehicles will be subject to the overload penalty if the maximum gross allowable road weight is exceeded by more than one ton. North Carolina violators also must pay additional license tax for overload up to the maximum permissible weight

The law has been amended to allow for the following maximum outy training with the Command- gross weights, but trucks still are subject to the axle weight of 18,-000 pounds except on highways designated as heavy duty, on which a five percent tolerance is allowed, making 18,900 pounds per axle
