Make Plans For 4-H Dairy Foods

plans for the 1949 National 4-H pairy Foods Demonstration program are under way in North Carolina, according to the State Extension Service. It is the only nationally sponsored 4-H Club program devoted entirely to demonstration. Members enrolled in a 4-H Foods project may participate. Last year North Carolina named 105 county winners. State honin for individual went to Hazel Garris of Farmville whose demonstration was given 11 times to a total of 502 persons. It was Drink Your Way to Health Dorothy Shields and Mary Farmer both of Cherokee county, won the team award with their demonstration, "A Simple Dessert for Every-Day Use," which they presented 35 times. Based on a survey of 41 states conducting the 1948 program, an average of 32 persons attended the 3,758 dairy foods demonstrations given by 4-H'ers. The program seeks to show the value of dairy products to general health. Uses of dairy foods and skill in preparing tasty dishes are demonstrated. Subjects relate to the preparation, manufacture or use of dairy products including iresh or evaporated milk, malted 6

milk and ice cream. Eight new awards based or demonstration records and general schievement are offered by the Carnation company this year. They are trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, November 27 to December 1. County winners will again receive a gold filled medal, while individual and team champions in each state will get a 17-jewel gold watch.

The Cooperative Extension Service supervises the program.

COMPETITION OPEN TO CHEROKEE, CLAY, GRAHAM C. AND UNION AND TOWNS COUNTIES, GEORGIA. N. Management of grounds, gates and police will be the officers of Fair Association. The Fair Grounds will be open to the public on Monday, September 26, 1949 and continue to October 1, 1949. The gates will be open each day at 9:00 o'clock A. M. The exhibit hall will be open to the public on Wednesday, September 28, at 3:00 P. M.

3. In case only one entry is exhibited in any one single class, prize money will be limited to second or third premiums, while ribbons will be awarded on quality.

4. All entries must be made and exhibits placed in their respective departments not later than 8:00 P. M. Tuesday, September 27.

The Association will not be responsible for any articles not claimed at time specified in rulin 2.

All exhibits must be checked out and removed from exhibit hall

between 9:00 a. m. and Noon Saturday, October Every animal and article on the grounds will be under the con-

trol of the Association and while every precaution will be taken for the safe keeping of same, the Association will in no way be responsible for any loss, damage or accident that may occur.

No animal will be allowed to run at large on the grounds, nor any hitching be allowed except at regular places alloted for that purpos

Where general and special rules conflict, the special rule shall apply

10 The Superintendent or manager of the respective departments of the fair will have supervision and control of the exhibit during the fair.

No person shall enter the area to exhibit his own stock or any 11. stock that he is interested in except as driver, rider or groom. Any violation of this rule will forfeit right to premium.

Any person or persons exhibiting animals or articles and who publicly expresses disapproval on the grounds, of the decision of the judges, or who by act of interference shall be guilty of conduct unbecoming to an exhibitor shall not be permitted to compete again for premiums at any Fair of this Association.

No premiums will be paid to persons not attending the fair. 14. Exhibitors are requested to bring livestock on Tuesday and to prepare to leave them until Saturday morning. Exhibitors are also requested to notify the manager of the department one week before date of Fair the amount of livestock to be exhibited so they or the County Farm Agents can supply ample room for sam All livestock exhibitors will be required to furnish their own 15. feed

16. All entries must be made at the required time, and an entry card giving the exhibitors number, department and class number shall be securely fastened to each article, and then placed in the section provided by manager of the respective department.

Department A

1. CLASS A GENERAL FARM EXHIBITS

The farm display must represent the individual farm and farm activity of the exhibitor. Each item in this display should be a CLAS miniature exposition and it should be the purpose of the exhibitor 31. to make each item carry the proper relationship in showing a well balanced farm and home program.

The display should be balanced with not too much of any one 34 thing being represented. It is not so desirable to just collect a CLAS number of items, but rather to make the exhibit reflect the entire 35. farm operation.

Regardless of the score card the display should be attractive and appealing to the eye. It should prove educational so that practical lessons may be drawn from it by farmers and others with reference to farm and home management as well as production and marketing practices.

The premium money offered in this department is sufficient to warrant the best efforts of the exhibitor and exhibitors are assured down to the fifth place of a premium which will help defray the expenses of bringing an exhibit to the fair.

A neat sign identifying the farm and farmer should be displayed with each exhibit.

Entry blanks will be furnished upon request to the Secretary of the Fair. Your entry on proper blanks must be in by Saturday, Noon September 17.

Each exhibitor will be required to file an affidavit with the Secretary of the Fair not later than Noon Monday, September 26, that all agricultural products shown in the display were produced on his farm.
