

Should the measure pass Cherhee County would be allocated \$372.843 for school buildings and \$1,478,000 for road building

School and road bond bills passed by the 1949 General Assembly allocate those amounts to be spent in the county, provided that the people authorize the issuance.

For school building Cherokee would get \$250,000 as its equal share of a \$25,000,000 appropriation by the General Assembly plus \$128,843 as its per-pupil share of the proceeds from the school bonds. The per-pupil share established by the General Assembly*is determined on the basis of the 1947-48 daily membbership.

The amount that would be spent in the county for road building, if issuance of the bonds is favored, is set forth exactly in the road bond bill.
