Andrews, Murphy Get \$14,272 For Street Maintenance

The 1949 General Assembly authorized an increase in the municipal fund from one million annually to two and one-half millions annually. Under this plan, Andrews will receive \$2,288, and Murphy \$11,984.

The General statutes require that the municipal fund shall be expended first on streets inside cities and towns which form a part of the state highway system, and secondly on "streets which form important connecting links" to the state highway system, or the county highway system, or farm to market roads.

The allocation is based on a formula stipulated by law: population, one-third; state highway mileage, one third; and engineer's recommendation, one third.

For Andrews the allotment is arrived at as follows: \$952 for population of 1,520; \$1,336 for highway mileage of 1.69 miles, and engineer's recommendations, none, making a total of \$2,288.

For Murphy, it is as follows: \$1,173 for population of 1,873; \$3,011 for highway mileage of 5.81; and engineer's recommendation, \$7,800, making a total of \$11,984.
