ANDREWS-The Andrews Rotary Club heard at its meeting here on Thursday, Supt. of Schools workers. Other members of the [], B. Hudson, who spoke on the immediate needs of the school in the Andrews unit. At his request two letters were read to the club members by Gordon L. Butler, both from Waldo C. Cheek, N. C. Commissioner of Insurance. One of these letters concerned the white building in the local school And the letter was one of "condemnation" for this building which was constructed in 1906. Supt. Hudson explained that the school board had no alternative but to use this building other than the dismissal of 283 pupils and their nine teachers. This building at present houses the first grade of five sections, the fifth grade of three sections, and the high school nome economics department

The Marble school building was structurally sound". Repairs were ecommended as to the roof, and other changes to make the building safe in case of fire.
