He traced the recent history of so called "state aid" in North Carolina. He said that North Carolina had gone further than any other state in supplying Capital Outlay funds for school buildings. It was Mr. Bueck's opinion that the State Board of Education will hold a tight rein on any moneys it controls for building purposes, and that no money will be available when fails to qualify according to "State standards".

Following the address, Capt. F. W. Swan made a brief talk on public education.

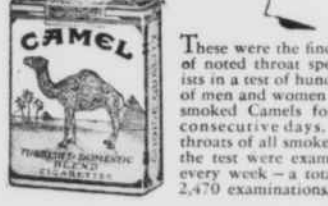

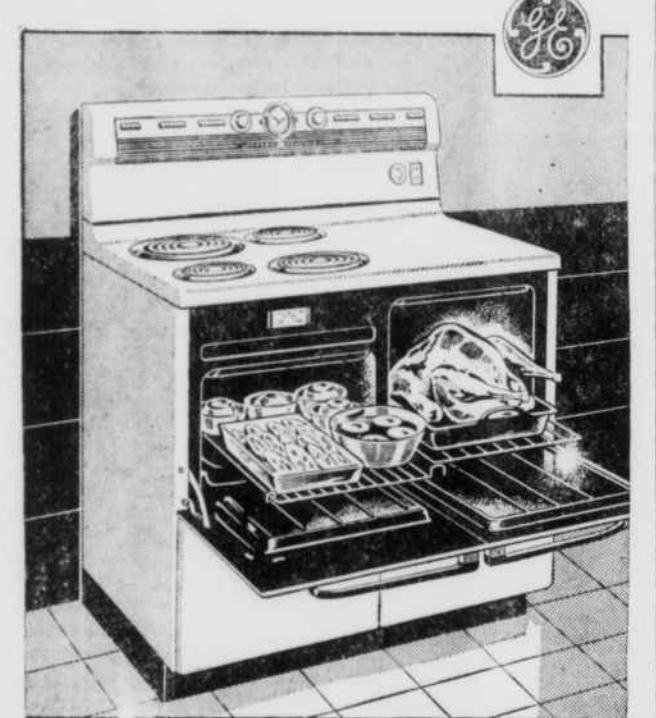
