Under the Go Forward bond road program of the State contricts for a total of 26.05 miles of blacktopping will be let on January 31. announces L. D. Thrash, 10th Division Highway Commissioner. Thrash met with the county

commissioners and other interested citizens at the courthouse Wednesday afternoon and announced that the following roads will be included in the January letting

Joe Brown Highway, 18 foet highway, 5.4 miles; Junaluska road, 16 foot highway, 2.5 miles; Little Brasstown road, 16 foot, 5.1 miles, Peachtree, 16 foot, 3.25 miles; old highway No. 294, 16 foot, 3.6 miles; Whitaker church road, 16 foot, 2.50 miles; Pilot Creek, 16 foot, 9 mile; Beaver Creek, 18 foot, 8 mile, making a total of 5.4 miles of 18 foot highway and 18.65 miles 16 foot highway.

The reason these roads have been selected is that they are wide enough and are ready for paving now. They are the only ones in the county that are now ready.

The only thing the contractors will have to do is place more rock on the roads, pack the rock down and put black top on them. The contractor who places the lowest and best bid will get the jobs. They will be paid by the ton for. the rock placed on the roads and by the mile for the black top. A state inspector will be on all jobs.
