Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, Nantahala National Forest, Franklin, North Carolina, up to and not later than 2:00 P. M. February 20, 1950, and opened immediately thereafter for all the timber marked for cutting, live or dead, standing or down, located on an area embracing about 194 acres within the Morris Creek Unit, Nantahala National Forest, Cherokee County, North Carolina, in the total number of 776 trees of the following species: Yellow poplar, northern red oak, red maple, white ash, white oak, black oak, chestnut oak, scarlet oak, pitch pine, black gum,

southern red oak and shortleaf pine. No bid of less than \$1007.00 as a lump sum payment for stumpage will be considered. In addition to the price bid for stumpage, a deposit of \$200.00 will be required for sale area betterment work. In addition to the above amounts, any unmarked timber which is authorized for cutting in connection with road construction or other improvements, or which is otherwise cut and subject to payment, will be paid for at the following current rates for stumpage: \$23.00 per MBM for white oak; \$20.00 per MBM for northern red oak, red maple, and white ash; \$17.00 per MBM for shortleaf pine; \$14.00 per MBM for yellow poplar and pitch pine; \$8.00 per MBM for black oak and chestnut oak; \$7.00 per MBM for scarlet oak and southern red oak and \$5.00 per

MBM for black gum. \$750.00 must be deposited with each bid to be applied on the purchase price, refunded or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale, and submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Franklin, North Carolina, or the District Ranger, Robbinsville, North Carolina. 27-30-c

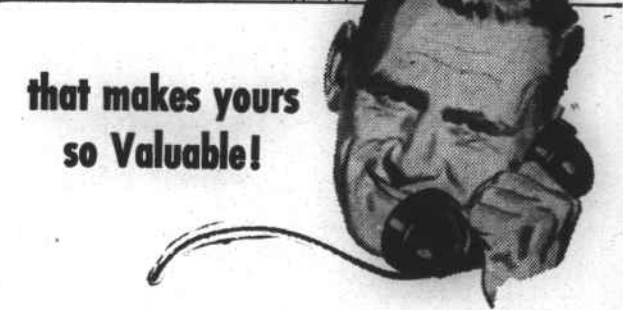

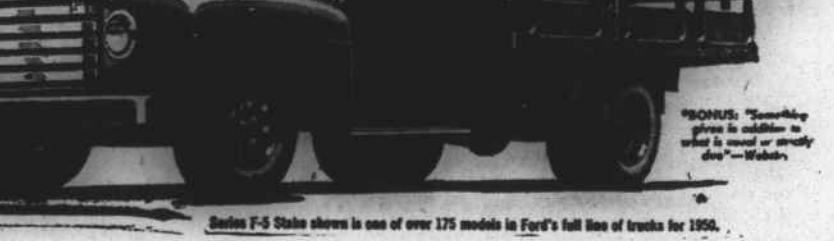
