He states that an organization for solicitation is complete, and that it is hoped the full quota will be raised on the first day of the campaign, March 1.

Workers who can will attend a dutch breakfast at 8 o'clock Wednesday morning, March 1, at New Regal Hotel, at which the field representative, W. D. Dibrell, and Mr. Byrum will give brief infom tion and instructions. At 9:15 the workers will go out to solicit from the people in their areas, reporting back to the chairman or to Treasurer Merle Davis as soon as their work is comple

Mr. Byrum asks that everybody have their contributions ready on the day of the drive, and if anyone fails to be contacted by a worker, to call him or the person working the area.

The chapter will retain 55.7 per cent or \$875 of the \$1570 quota. and send 44.3 percent or \$695 to National headquarters. The chapter's funds this year will be spent principally on the blood program and rendering service to men in military service or veterans.


