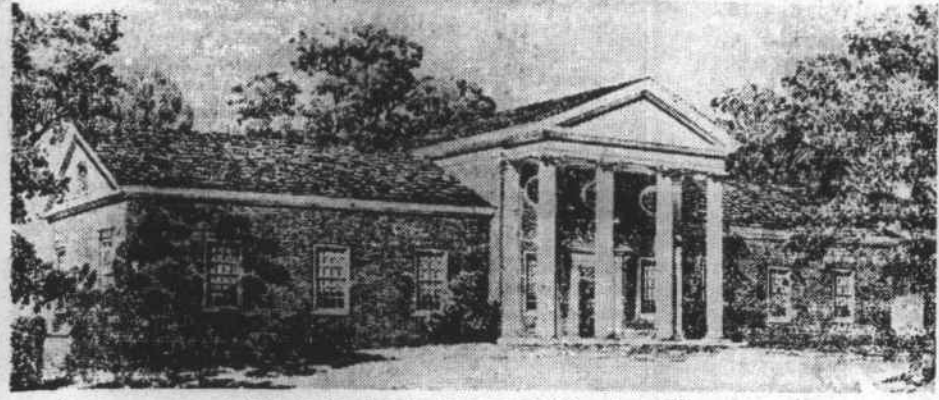


## Red Cross Fund Campaign Is To Be Held March 1st

#### Workers Named By Rev. R. D. Byrum

The Rev. Delbert Byrum, pastor of First Methodist Church, who is serving as chairman of the 1950 fund campaign of the Cherokee County Chapter of the American Red Cross, announces that the chapter's quota this year is \$1,570. He states that an organization for solicitation is complete, and that it is hoped the full quota will be raised on the first day of the campaign, March 1.

Workers who can will attend a dutch breakfast at 8 o'clock Wednesday morning, March 1, at New Regal Hotel, at which the field representative, W. D. Dittrell, and Mr. Byrum will give brief information and instructions. At 9:15 the workers will go out to solicit from the people in their areas, reporting back to the chairman or to Treasurer Merle Davis as soon as their work is complete.

Mr. Byrum asks that everybody have their contributions ready on the day of the drive, and if anyone fails to be contacted by a worker, to call him or the person working the area.

The chapter will retain 55.7 percent or \$875 of the \$1570 quota, and send 44.3 percent or \$695 to National headquarters. The chapter's funds this year will be spent principally on the blood program and rendering service to men in military service or veterans.

#### Near Goal For March Of Dimes Local Campaign

The Lenten season is observed in the Lutheran Church prior to Easter as a means of helping each Christian understand the hardships and the sacrifice of the road to Calvary. It is a season of self examination and rededication. Dr. Hall's lectures will be informal and will review what the Bible teaches concerning the five basic parts of Christianity. The topics will be of general interest to everyone.

Dr. Hall has spoken a number of times in Andrews and is well-known to many. He received his education at Lenoir Rhyne College, the University of Pennsylvania, Southern Lutheran Seminary, Columbia, S. C., and Mt. Airy Lutheran Theological Seminary, Philadelphia, Pa. Having been a home missionary for fifteen years, he became a Chaplain in the United States Army during World War I serving 23 years until his retirement in 1940.
