### W. P. Walker Wins Award As Dairy Tester

William P. Walker of Andrews has been awarded a ten dollar eash prize and a citation for his cutstanding performance as herd tester for the dairymen of Cherekee and Clay Counties. Mr. Walker was judged among the top five supervisors in North Carolina and was given the award by National Dairies, which annually makes awards to outstanding dairymen and herd testers.

The job of herd tester, or DHIA Supervisor is considered important by progressive dairymen. The fact that the dairymen continue to pay for his services is evidence that they find the DHIA Supervisor's services profitable to them.

DHIA (Dairy Herd Improvement Association) is responsible for much of the improvement seen on the modern dairy farm. M and Ph. D. degrees from Southern Baptist Theological Semimary in Louisville. He also holds honorary degrees from Furman. and from Baylor University, Waco. Texas

Dr. McCall left the pastorate of Broadway Baptist Church, Louisville, in 1943 to become president of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. He held the latter position until May of 1946 when e became executive secretary of he Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee.
