Murphy's Population Shows Big Increase

decided increase in population :n the 1950 Census figures released Wednesday by J. Harry Sample, ristrict census supervisor. The population of Murphy now stands at 2,429, as compared with the 1940 count of 1,273.

Cherokee County and the Town of Andrews, however, showed decreases. The county population now stands at 18,296, slightly less than the 1940 figure of 18,813 The Town of Andrews now has 1.-198 population, as compared with 1,520 in 1940.

There are 2,084 farms and 4,-168 dwelling units in the county. Murphy has 746 dwelling units, and Andrews 419.

Quentin Roosevelt Townson, 31, of Murphy was fatally injured when the car in which he was riding crashed into the abutment of the concrete bridge over Culberson Creek on Highway 60 near the Georgia State line about 3 a m. Sunday.

He and Harry Zimmerman, 25, also of Murphy were returning home from Atlanta, Zimmerman was driving, and it is assumed that he fell asleep, causing the car to strick the bridge on the left side of the road. The car was demolished.

The two men were brought to a local hospital. Townson was pronounced dead just as they were preparing to take him into the

Zimmerman, a patient in hospital, suffered head and face injuries and a crushed foot.
