J. H. Wilson Says **He Welcomes New Orleans Suit**

An Associated Dispatch of August 17 announced that J. H. Wilson of Murphy had been indicted by the New Orleans Federal Grand Jury for violation of the Jenkins Acts, which was designed to require sellers of cigarettes in interstate commerce to make reports to State Officials.

Mr. Wilson, proprietor of Cooperative Buying Service here, states that his organization welcomes this suit. He says they have been endeavoring for the past ten months, through the association of which they are members, to have some such action brought so that the constitutionality of this law can be brought to a test before the

He states further: "We are confident not only that the Jenkins laws are unconstitutional in that they attempt to assess discriminatory taxes on a common necessity up to as much as 400 per cent of Home in charge. the first sales value. Some forty States are now exacting upwards law, these State laws will have to 14 grandchildren. be examined and ruled upon by the Highest Court, something that we have long wished might be possible. It is true that we are making no reports of any client to any State authorities, nor ever will, because there is no Federal Law whatsoever existing that in any way attempts to make our activities criminal in any sense of the word.

"I am not the least bit disconcerted about this move. As a matter of fact. I am proud to be the "guinea pig" when it comes to the question of any challenge to the liberties and fundamental rights guaranteed to the American Citizen by the United States Constitution."

In closing we reiternate that this most recent action was designed for no other purpose than to intimidate, brow-beat, and mislead the public.
