Cecil Phillips of Marble received a message August 18, that his nephew, Pfc. James J. Phillips is missing in action in Korea. Phillips was born June 22, 1930 in Ducktown, Tenn., the son of Mr. and Mrs. Will Phillips. He attended school in Ducktown, and at the age of eight or nine years, he came to live with his uncle at Marble.

He attended school a short time in Murphy, then at Tomotla until about 14 years of age.

On December 10, 1946, he enlisted in the Army. After basic training he went to Korea for a year, returned to the states, then was sent to Japan. On February 1, 1948, he went to Korea. His people heard from him only once in awhile.

His father and mother are separated and both have remarried. His father living in Maryville, Tenn., and his mother, Mrs. Cleo Thierow, in Rock Hill, S. C.

There are four brothers, Johnny of Marble, David, George and Western of Maryville, and a sister, Miss Christine Phillips of Maryville.

There is absolutely no cost to the child or parent, no obligation of any kind.

The pictures will be made free those two days and on Tuesday and Wednesday, October 17 and 18, all of the pictures taken will be run on the screen just like the movie stars. Proprietor P. J. Henn says, "Plan now to have your child at Murphy Supply Company on one of these days, at hours stated".

ANDREWS—The third annual air and thrill show, to be held at the Andrews-Murphy Airpark on Sunday, September 3, is scheduled to begin promptly at 2:30 p. m.

The show is again sponsored by the Leslie Stillman Post of the Andrews American Legion. Herman K. Brauer, Commander, Jack L. McCraney, and Capt. F. W. Swan have booked a program consisting of both ground and air acts to broaden its appeal to the general public.

For the first time in any show at the local airport, a plane will be looped with a man standing on the wing. This hazardous act will be performed by Henry Mallette, of Tennesse, Ga., who also will provide thrills with other stunts outside the airplane.

"Ace" Plimmmons of Marion will provide the ground thrills as he races his car through a flaming board wall and later rolls it over at 60 miles an hour. Ace has over 2,000 parachute jumps to his credit, and will jump twice in the show, one being a bat-wing jump.

The perennial favorite, Oscar Meyer, Jr. of Hendersonville, will again present his hilarious antics with a Piper Cub. So well have Oscar's performances been received by the public that W. E. Magie will fly a second "crazy cub" act for the show. Magie, "the only man in the world who snap-rolls a BT on takeoff", is also scheduled to do spectacular low-altitude acrobatics in a BT-13A.

All precautions will be taken for the safety of participants and spectators, according to Edgar A. Wood, Jr., manager of the local field. Members of the State Highway Patrol, local city police, and members of the sponsor's organization will assist in keeping the event moving smoothly.

A certificate of waiver has been secured from the Civil Aeronautics, Nashville District, since practically all of the flying in the show will involve violations of CAA rules and regulations. Adequate plans have been drafted to streamline the expected heavy flow of auto traffic to and from the show area. Plans are also being made by the Legion and local flyers to play host to a considerable number of visiting planes expected from surrounding fields in this tri-state area. The field will be closed to arriving air traffic at 2:15 P. M.

Advance ticket sales are being conducted by Andrews Chamber of Commerce members and representatives. Net proceeds realized by the Andrews Chamber of Commerce will be applied toward retirement of the lighting fund debt on the Andrews Athletic Field.

The usual agreement has been made with air show personnel to declare September 3 a "weather date". If the weather is unfavorable, the show will be held Labor Day, September 4, and tickets will be honored on that date.

Many Improvements Made Andrews School

ANDREWS—The opening of the Andrews city unit schools on Tuesday, Sept. 5, will disclose a number of improvements made during the summer.

In the high school building new desks will be seen in Mrs. Aline E. Bristol's room. Desks in other rooms have been sanded, cut marks have been erased so far as possible, and book shelves have been placed in all desks. More than \$100 worth of new library books have been added to the high school library. Three new typewriters and a \$500 printing calculator have been added to the commercial department.

More than \$500 worth of work has been done on under pinning the auditorium floor.

A new classroom has been arranged in the building known as the janitor's home. This new room which has been equipped with new chair desks throughout will house a section of the third grade. A second grade is already housed in this building. New toilets have been installed, and new chalkboards placed.
