## Dr. A. V. Murray Of England To Speak At Y. H. C.

Dr. A. Victor Murray, President of Cheshunt College, Cambridge, England, will address the opening session at Young Harris College Friday, Sept. 22, at 11:00 a. m. Dr. Murray comes directly from Canada, where he served as Chairman of the World Council of Christian Education, meeting in Toronto
