Freedom Campaign To Close October 24

Freedom campaign, which was scheduled to end this week, has been extended to Tuesday, October 24, it is announced by Chairman Percy B. Ferebee.

The Crusade was launched nationally on Monday, September 4, with a radio address by General Eisenhower but did not get under way in the Carolinas until October 1. Now, because of the campaign's growing momentum throughout the state and nation the closing date has been postponed until the 24th of this month

More than a million Americans have already signed the Freedom Scrolls. As a result of the extension, it is hoped that the total number of scroll signers will reach five million. North Carolina's quota in this vital drive to combat the high-geared Soviet propia ganda machine and keep the world free from Communism is 150,000 signatures. However, state Crusade officials are hoping that as many as half a million Tar Heels will sign the scrolls.
