Mr. and Mrs. Paul Sims of Murthy received a telegram from the War Department Friday, October 20, stating that their son, Cpl. Claude T. Sims was killed in action n Korea on September 5, 1950.

Cpl. Sims was born November 5. 1930, at Baldwin, Ga., and attended Glenville and Murphy

He was employed by the Trailways Bus System prior to his entry into the Army on July 20, 1949. Cpl. Sims received his training at Fort Jackson, S. C., and served with the 44th Engineers of the Third Army, at Fort Bragg.

Cpl. Simms later received orders to report to Camp Stoneman, Calif., to sail for Japan, and he sailed June 22, 1950, on the U. S. S. General Collins.

On July 16, Cpl. Sims wrote his mother that he was only 40 miles from the front in Korea and would be in action when she received Cherokee Countians be in action when she received the letter. He was with the famous 24th Infantry Division.

The parents received their last etter from him on September 2. Mrs. Sims says, "He was his unselfish self telling us not to worry about him, and that he would soon be coming home".

On October 6, his sweetheart received a letter from a buddy of Cpl. Sims, which read in part:

"We were buddies and were together operating a switch board when we hit a road block at An-Gong-Ni, and as far as I know Sims didn't come through.
