The State Highway Con has completed one and one-half additional miles of new road improvements in Cherokee County under the \$200,000 000 bond issue

The following work was completed during December:

(1) Grading and surfacing with traffic bound macadam were completed on the Long Branch Road

(2) Stabilizing and strengthen ing were completed on the Morrow Road for 0.2 mile; Shoal Creek Road, 0.5; Loop Road, 0.4.

During the 12 months of 1950 the State Highway Commission hard-surfaced over 4,500 miles of roads throughout North Carolina to triple its pace of roadbuilding over previous years. Dr. Henry W. Jordan, Highway Commission has announced that more work was finished this past year on the state's primary road system than at any time in the Commission's history. County Farmers Improve Pastures

The Agricultural Conservation Program gave a big boost to efforts to provide more and better pastures on Cherokee County farms during the 1950 calendar year, according to the local PMA office

Some 800 County farmers seeded 2150 acres of permanent pastures with 50 percent of the "outof-the-pocket" cost furnished through the ACP, H. B. McNabb Chairman of the Cherokee County Production and Marketing Administration Committee, announced

The PMA Chairman pointed out that this acreage represents an increase of 2000 acres seeded to pastures by farmers under the ACP last year.

Pasture seed, made available to participating farmers through the program's purchase order system. included 4303 pounds of ladino; 20640 pounds of orchard grass; and 3453 pounds of fescue,

"Farmers who obtain pasture seed under the program are always ssured of high quality seed," the farm leader said, "as only seed meeting high germination and purity tests are made available"

Not only in Cherokee County, but throughout the State, farmers are taking advantage of services offered through the Agricultural Conservation Program to aid them establish more and better perman ent pastures. Recent announce ment by G. Tom Scott, State PMA Chairman, Raleigh, reveals that 225.500 acres of permanent pastures were seeded in the State with ACP assistance during the 1950 calendar year. This compares with 167,228 acres established under the program last year, and 98 000 acres in 1948.

Pasture seed made through the purchase order plan to participating farmers through out the State included 1,549,591 pounds of orchard grass; 987,021 of fescue; 15 030 white dutch clover and 437,658 of ladino clover.

"Assistance provided under the Agricultural Conservation Program," Scott said, "has proved the most effective and efficient means of getting essential conservation work done on the land of indivi dual farmers."

"This method of assistance does not require the farmer to pay, in the initial outlay, the entire cost an incentive for many farmers financially unable to bear the entire cost at seeding time, to take advantage of the pasture practice, Scott explained.

"The share of cost provided under the ACP also represents the public interest and in conservation of the soil", he added.

The Agricultural Conservation Program is available to all farmers in Cherokee County. With the 1951 program already approved, farmers are urged to visit their county PMA office at Murphy, North Carolina to discuss their conservation needs for the com-
