### \$50,331 Invested In E Bonds Here

U. S. Savings Bonds sales in Cherokee County for December totaled \$50,331.00. All of this was in Series E Bonds. County Savings Bond Chairman, W. D. Whitaker, released the sales announcement based on the monthly report received from Allison James, State Savings Bonds Director in Greensboro.

The total sales figures for North Carolina's 100 counties were as follows: Series E, \$3,609,497.25; Series F, \$345,321.00; Series G, \$2,128,900.00; total, \$6,083,718.25.

The nation-wide mobilization effort for defense against communism is having a stimulating effect on the sale of U. S. Savings Bonds in North Carolina as well as in the rest of the nation, Mr. Whitaker said.

Other statements were that since the Fall Payroll Savings Drive began in November, 65 additional firms have installed the Plan, bringing the total to 258 large firms now actually operating Payroll Savings Plans for their employees in North Carolina. In addition, 109 other firms have signified their intention to install and promote the Plan in January.

The Payroll Savings Drive will continue until every firm in the state with 100 or more employees has been contacted and asked to join in this important nation-wide Savings and Thrift Program.

Farmers also are being urged to invest in Savings Bonds as a financial reserve. Mr. Whitaker said. As in World War II the farmers of this county will, I am sure, put their shoulders to the wheel in support of the important Savings Bonds Program.

### Howard Kester Is Speaker

The Rev. Howard Kester, Director of the John C. Campbell Folk School, addressed a meeting of The Smoky Mountain Home Economics Association at the Regal Hotel Monday evening.

The speaker told his audience that they have a great opportunity and a large responsibility in carrying to the homes, through the Home Demonstration service, a better knowledge of what and how to do in home making. Speaking of the teaching of crafts and improved methods, he said, that these workers have a sacred trust in the developing of creative ability in the homes. By developing rural leadership they are sharing their heritage with the rest of the world.

Commenting on the scope of these agencies, he told them the hope of the world is largely through these small and rural groups.

The president, Miss Meredith Whitaker, of Andrews, presided. Miss Edna Bishop introduced the speaker.

Hand made "Gay Birds" were distributed as favors.

### P. M. A. Issuing Purchase Orders

Purchase orders for grass seed are being issued at the P. M. A. office in the Courthouse now. Farmers get their orchard grass, fescue, and ladino clover seed at approximately half price by using these orders, according to Ralph Shields, secretary. Mr. Shields says that March 31 is the deadline, and that after that date seed will not be furnished under this plan. No grass seed will be issued which is to be used for re-seeding ground that was seeded last fall. Seed and fertilizer orders are being issued to all farmers who plan to use on pasture lands, says Mr. Shields.

Dr. J. C. Canipe, secretary of Evangelism of the Baptist State Convention and director of the Freshers' School at Fruitland, spoke at a Baptist mass meeting here Monday on the Evangelistic Campaign that is to be conducted by Baptist Churches east of the Mississippi River March 25-April 8. He reported that the campaign already is "catching fire" throughout North Carolina and the Southland.

He said the crusade is predicated upon three things: 1. The Crucifixion of Christ who died for the sins of everybody. 2. People without this crucified Christ are lost. There are 39,000,000 unawakened in the Southern Baptist Convention area and 1,500,000 in North Carolina. 3. Christian people and the Church are divinely appointed to carry the message to the lost world.

"If these hosts of lost were to die tonight," he declared, "They would wake up in an endless hell. We need to get ourselves in tune with God and our brethren. It is later than we think it is. We are in the battle to death at this hour, and yet we continue to let sin flow freely in our land. We continue cursing, drinking, lying, cheating and hating. The judgment of God seems to be coming down upon us. Any day we might wake up to hear that New York City or Washington, D. C., has been wiped off the map. If that happened, everyone would be on his knees asking God to be merciful. Why can't we do that before it is too late?"
