# **School Trustee Bills Are Passed**

The bill to appoint as trustees of Andrews School District Frank Wilhide, W. C. McKeldrey, Harold Jenkins, James R. Bryson, Mrs. G. W. Cover and Dr. C. W. Van Gorder for two year terms was enacte into law by the Senate Monday. It had been passed by the House previously.

At the expiration of their terms in 1952, under a second bill, Andrews School trustees will be elected by the people of the district. This bill was also enacted into law.

Both bills were introduced by Rep. J. H. Duncan.

### **Bill To Permit Spending TVA Fund** Is Introduced
