Distribution Of Electricity Gains In Cherokee

In the last fifteen years rural electrification in North Carolina has grown from 1,694 miles of distribution to 65,360.30 miles. The 11,588 rural customers of 1935 have become the 417,518 customers as of July 1, 1950.

As of July 1, 1950, Cherokee county had 352.63 miles of distribution lines which were serving 2,094 consumers. Clay county had 131 miles of distribution lines serving 1,147 consumers.

In these two adjoining counties a total of nearly 500 miles of distribution lines carries current to over 3,000 consumers. In the entire state approximately nine out of ten rural families, farm and non-farm, now have electricity. In 1935 3.2% of the farms were electrified. As of July 1, 1950 88.6% of the farms are electrified. Compared with North Carolina, the percentage of farms in the entire United States that are electrified is 86.3%. The N. C. R. E. A. estimate that 254,068 farms in the state are supplied with electricity.

R. E. A., Rural Electrification Authority, had, in 1950, 32,692.98 miles of distribution lines. Privately owned utilities had 29,056.46 miles, and municipalities and Public institutions had the balance. With these power lines, R. E. A. serves 137,302 consumers while privately owned utilities serve 244,743.

Ditches Dug With Dynamite

Six men made a ditch 625 feet long near here in two hours recently. They used dynamite and "shot" the ditch on Burton Cornwell's farm on Martins Creek across a piece of land that has been useless for years. It required 250 pounds of dynamite which was worth \$75.

County Extension Agents with the Extension Engineering Specialist, Howard Ellis, demonstrated to two groups of farmers last week. They state that blasting ditches with dynamite can be the cheapest, easiest and certainly the quickest method of draining wet land.

This method is especially suitable for open ditches as it leaves a "V" shaped ditch which can be mowed to control growth of weeds and shrubs. There is no ridge of soil along the bank.

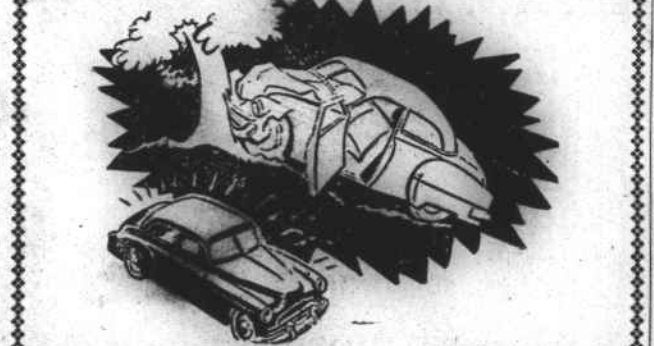
