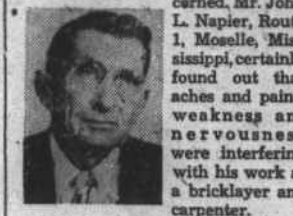
St. Andrews Lutheran Church will be Mrs. Boyd Cooper, who will also attend.
