The movies are to be used all over the world as a means of truthfully portraying American life as its best. Since many peoples of foreign countries, especially in the Near and Far East cannot understand the English language and therefore cannot be benefitted by broadcasts of the Voice of America, these films are designed to appeal to the eye and carry an important message regarding every day life in America. 
