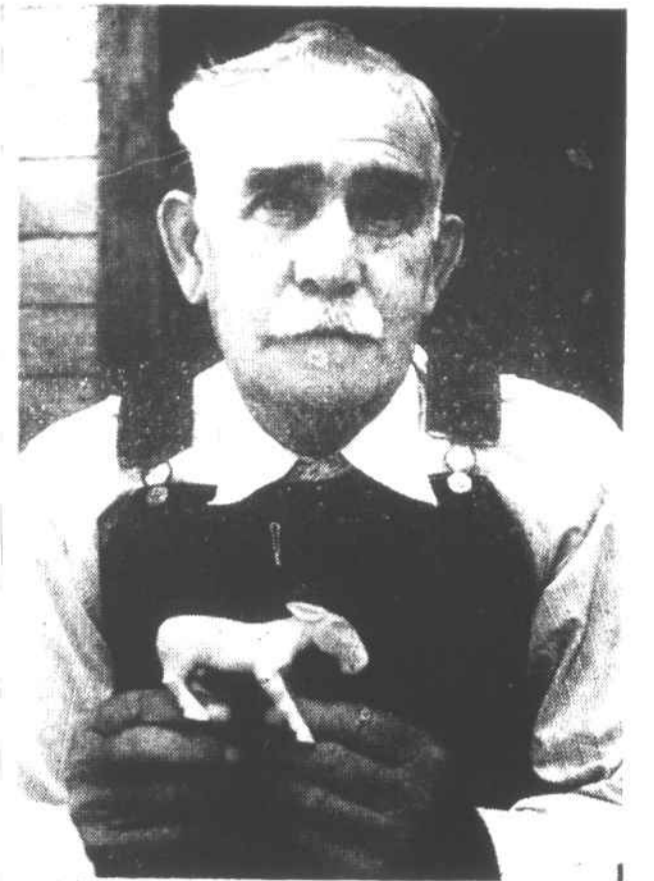
### Mrs. P. P. Gregory To Address H. D. Tri-County Meet
