Roscoe Dockery, 34, was instantly killed June 13, when a large rock struck him in the chest while he was working on a construction job at Bonville, Oregon.

In the case of Everett A. Mintz vs Town of Murphy, "Before any evidence was introduced, the defendant having demurred ore tenus to the complaint, and the plaintiff, thereupon, having made a motion to file an amended complaint," a mistrial was ordered. The plaintiff was given 15 days in which to file an amended complaint, and the defendant 15 days thereafter within which to answer.

Simonds and his fellow Infantrymen advanced forty-five miles over extremely mountainous terrain in a three day period.

They attacked the City of Hwachon on the western end of the Hwachon Reservoir and captured more than two hundred prisoners as well as forty truckloads of enemy ammunition and equipment.

Private Simonds wears the Combat Infantryman Badge and the Korean Service Medal.
